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Traveling cyclones! Cyclones (or general storms) are now becoming less frequent and less severe, due to approaching spring and summer, and also because their track lies farther to the north in the warmer months of the year. Some of them travel only short distances, say 500 miles, while others cover enormously long paths. One of the most persistent, which formed near Havre, Montana, crossed North America, the Atlantic, Europe, Asia, the Pacific and nearly across this continent the second time. It covered, in its travels, 21,400 miles in 29 days, averaging about 30 miles an hour, which is about the speed of a winter cyclone.

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
